

MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTOR

Dear Supporters,

I am very excited to present you with Fort Collins Cat Rescue & Spay/Neuter Clinic's 2011 Annual Report. This report will highlight the amazing things accomplished by our organization in 2011 thanks to the support and generosity of our community.

Each year is an opportunity for FCCRSNC to learn, grow and become a more effective nonprofit overall. In 2011 a name change to better incorporate our two primary services went into effect. Many people did not realize that the "cat rescue" and the "spay/neuter clinic" were part of the same organization, which led to quite a bit of confusion. After much deliberation and feedback from people like you, the decision was made to keep our original name and add "& Spay/Neuter Clinic." Many folks expressed the importance of continuing to recognize our commitment to helping cats (ironically the underdog of animal welfare), as it is one of the most important aspects of what sets us apart from many other organizations.

Another big change in 2011 was the expansion of two FCCRSNC programs that were designed to help keep pets in homes and out of shelters: Kitty Kibble Supply and PAL (Prevent A Litter). Early in 2011 we began offering dog food in addition to cat food through Kitty Kibble Supply, which necessitated a name change. The program now goes by Kibble Supply Pet Food Pantry. I think you will be surprised to see on Page 3 how many cats, dogs, and pet owners have benefitted from this program.

Our PAL program, which has provided free spay/neuter services to cats and dogs belonging to disadvantaged community members, grew to include free vaccinations and microchipping. The program now goes by PAL+ (Prevent A Litter Plus). On Page 4 you can see the record-setting number of animals helped through PAL+ in 2011.

I'm so proud of what our organization has evolved into over the years. We strive to not only help the cats and dogs in our community, but also to support the people in our community so that they can be responsible pet owners. Thank you for being such an important part of our growth. With your help we **can** make every pet a wanted pet.

Our Mission

Fort Collins Cat Rescue & Spay/Neuter Clinic is dedicated to the well-being of all cats and dogs in our community with emphasis on preventing pet overpopulation and on the sheltering and placement of surrendered or abandoned cats into loving, permanent homes.





OUR HISTORY

Fort Collins Cat Rescue was established in June 2006 as an adoption guarantee, nonprofit cat shelter. In March 2007 the rescue opened Fort Collins Spay/Neuter, a low-cost sterilization clinic for both dogs and cats. In 2011, the name was officially changed to Fort Collins Cat Rescue & Spay/Neuter Clinic to more fully incorporate the clinic. Since their inception, the shelter found homes for more than 3,700 cats, and the clinic performed over 17,500 surgeries on dogs and cats by end of year 2011.

SHELTER SERVICES

KITTY COLLABORATIONS



Nine agencies from across three states transferred a total of 160 felines to our shelter, including 5 from Wyoming, 59 from New Mexico and 96 from within Colorado.

Northern Colorado

Friends of Ferals brought 56 felines to our shelter after trappings.

FOSTER PROGRAM

Our volunteer foster home program allows us to rescue more cats and kittens every year than we would be able to with just our shelter alone.




We began the human services program
Kitty Kibble Supply in February 2010 to assist
low-income families and feral colony
caretakers in feeding their cats.

In 2011 we added dog food to

the offering and changed the program's name to Kibble Supply Pet Food Pantry. Now we are able to help both cat and dog owners experiencing financial hardship make sure their furry family members stay fed.

PREVENT A LITTER PLUS (PAL+)

The continued national economic downturn

provided an opportunity for FCCRSNC to proactively develop multiple programs aimed at keeping pets in their caring homes.

In February the

PAVE (Providing Access to Vaccines for Everyone)

vaccine assistance program was launched as a complement to the existing PAL (Prevent A Litter) program. In September we added free microchipping to the list of PAL and PAVE services and combined the programs to create PAL+ (Prevent A Litter Plus).

PAL+ provides spay/neuter surgeries, vaccines and microchipping free of charge to pet owners who demonstrate financial need either through proof of low income or documents showing they're receiving government assistance.

We kicked off PAL+ by setting up a booth at Poudre Valley Mobile Home Park in mid-September. Our executive director was joined by our outreach coordinator and a bi-lingual volunteer to help residents learn more about how they could get help with the basic needs for their pets. Having a volunteer who could speak Spanish was very beneficial, as a number

of pet owners did not speak English.

In 2011 applications for PAL+ almost doubled from 2010, and the program exceeded our goal of spaying and neutering 300 pets.

We are proud to announce that we served 376 dogs and cats through the Prevent A Litter Plus program in 2011 and provided sterilization for 320 of these animals.



Volunteer Program

The shelter functions primarily through the work of our volunteers. All of the daily cleaning and feeding chores are performed by volunteers during two-hour morning and

afternoon shifts. Volunteers also enhance the well-being of the shelter cats by

providing grooming, playtime and extra socialization. Experienced volunteers serve as counselors who help adopters choose the right cat for their home. The spay/neuter clinic also utilizes volunteer help, including Colorado State University pre-veterinary students seeking hands-on experience.

PAL+ Program

The Prevent A Litter Plus (PAL+) program provides free spay/neuter, vaccinations and microchipping for dogs and cats belonging to pet owners who can prove need. There were 320 total pets sterilized through this program, a 27.5% increase over 2010.

BY THE NUMBERS ...

- 50 female cats spayed
- 37 male cats neutered
- 58% increase over 2010 in number sterilized during Spay Day

We celebrated Spay Day by offering spay and neuter surgeries for cats for only \$15 each. The clinic's normal spay/neuter fees are \$55 for a female cat and \$35 for a male cat. The drastically reduced \$15

rate was made possible because all of the staff and veterinarians were volunteering their surgical skills and expertise that day.

Whiskers 'n Wags Jubilee in

In 2011 our fourth annual fundraising dinner was renamed Whiskers 'n Wags Jubilee and was attended by nearly 300 supporters. The "Catsablanca" themed gala was held at the Hilton Fort Collins, and its silent and live auctions netted \$54,000 to aid all of the cats in our care and to help support our spay/neuter clinic and human assistance programs. This was a \$15,000 increase over the 2010 Chat Amour event.




